 - 6. Explain the position and power of the Prime Minister in British constitutional law and practice to-day.

 - (a) The Cabinet Secretariat.
 - (b) The Minister of Defence.
 - (c) Ministers of Cabinet rank.
 - (d) The Ministers of the Crown Act, 1937.
